Outdoor Fire Safety: How to prevent wildfires

Nine out of ten wildfires are caused by people. Follow these tips to enjoy the outdoors safely and responsibly.

DEBRIS BURNING

- Check for local outdoor burning bans and regulations.
- Stay updated on weather conditions and avoid burning on hot, dry or windy days.
- Keep your debris pile small and manageable with the ground cleared of anything flammable by at least 10 feet.
- Avoid overhead obstructions such as trees, powerlines and structures.
- Wet the area around the burn pile and keep a water source nearby.
- If using a burn barrel, choose a metal barrel in good condition with a metal screen placed on top with holes not larger than 5/8 inch. Have three evenly spaced 3 inch vents backed by metal screen near the bottom of the barrel to allow for air flow.
- Do NOT leave a fire unattended.

VEHICLE/EQUIPMENT USE

- Keep vehicles and equipment well maintained including proper tire inflation.
- Do not park, drive or idle in tall, dry grass. The undercarriage of the vehicle and exhaust can get hot enough to ignite the grass.
- Ensure tow chains are not dragging on the road.
- Monitor heavy equipment for overheating and regularly check for obstructions.
- When welding, grinding or cutting, clear and wet down the work area. Have a spotter and water or fire extinguisher on hand.
- Be mindful when using any outdoor equipment that generates heat, friction, or sparks such as tractors, hay balers, lawn mowers, chainsaws, welders, grinders, and cutting torches.
- Keep a fire extinguisher on heavy equipment.

CAMPFIRES AND GRILLING


- Check for local outdoor fire restrictions first.
- Build campfires in a cleared area and within a fire ring or pit, keeping it small.
- Place grills in a cleared area with no overhead obstructions
- Be mindful of children and pets near campfires and grills.
- After cooking, allow for coals to cool and dispose in a metal bucket.
- Do NOT travel with a lit or hot grill in the back of a truck or trailer!
- Never leave hot grills or campfires unattended and always have a water source nearby.
